A Message from Father George Alexson

Therefore I speak to them in parables, because seeing they do not see, and hearing they do not hear, nor do they understand... 'For the hearts of this people have grown dull. Their ears are hard of hearing, And their eyes they have closed, Lest they should see with their eyes and hear with their ears, Lest they should understand with their hearts and turn, So that I should heal them.' (Mt. 13:13, 15)

Beloved Parishioners and Friends,

Christ is Risen! Truly, He is Risen!

I pray my message finds you all in good health. While my heart grieves for the havoc caused in our world by Covid-19, I am confident that, with God's mercy, a cure will be found eventually, to stem the tide of its cruel consequences. We mourn the loss of thousands of lives around the world. We grieve for those who continue to suffer from the virus, while we honor all those heroes caring for them. Most folks are struggling to follow the guidelines established by our government agencies, to prevent the spread of the virus. Many are becoming restless, clamoring to be released from the restrictions of an "imprisoned" life. Most of all, we, devoted Christians and parishioners of Holy Apostles, like faithful believers everywhere, are anxious to get beyond the dangers of the virus, in order to return to our churches. Perhaps as never before, we have come to appreciate the words of the psalmist, "LORD, I have loved the habitation of Your house, And the place where Your glory dwells" (Ps. 26:8). Let us add our own prayer: Most merciful Father, we beseech You with heart and soul, make it possible for us to return quickly to Your house, for outside it we have neither hope, nor life, nor strength, nor divine nourishment.

I chose the passage above from St. Matthew for a purpose. It will take some time for all the investigations to be completed as to where and how this virus started. But, we know for certain that it originated in China. I stress this fact for two reasons: first, China is a communist country that severely limits the rights and privileges of its citizens. Second, China is a militantly atheistic country that fervently represses all expressions of religious faith, more often than not, brutally. This leads to the inevitable question: Why are we doing business with this country? The United States and its allies have spilled much blood and spent trillions of dollars

trying to impose democracy on countries around the globe. Why not China? The notion that investing in China would eventually lead its communist bosses to embrace democracy, once their citizens began to enjoy the fruits of economic development and success, was, is and always will be a fools errand. As we learned with the former Soviet Union, it is only when the communist system disintegrates from the weight of its own corruption, dishonesty, lack of industry and hopelessness, that it will finally collapse.

Why, then, are we doing business with China? Two reasons shout out immediately: greed and hypocrisy! Greed, because we all want cheap stuff and, corporations make a lot more for less in China than they would in the U.S. The hypocrisy factor is no less clear, when we remember how many lives have been lost and money wasted trying to impose democracy on countries where democratic principles have no roots in either their history or culture. But, here, too, someone was making money. A heavy price is paid when we refuse to heed the Apostle's words, "For the love of money is a root of all kinds of evil, for which some have strayed from the faith in their greediness, and pierced themselves through with many sorrows" (I Tim. 6:10).


Our world has been pierced with many sorrows because of the virus, and, if the predictions are correct, more are to follow. Is it not time, then, for us, leaders and citizens alike, to open our eyes and ears, quicken our hearts to God's word and, proclaim loudly and unequivocally to Communist China: repent or, be isolated from the rest of the world (!)? American

businesses must be compelled to disinvest in China and, return to the safe harbor of their own home. The *bottom line* must no longer be the favored principle by which all else is governed and guided. Or, do American CEO's really want to admit that people are dispensable, unlike stocks and profit margins?

Quo vadis, America, is a question that should haunt the hearts and minds of every American citizen in the wake of this pandemic. When the threat of this virus has passed, will we still be "the land of the brave and the free?" Should we not be concerned with how quickly our freedoms were suppressed for "fear of the virus?" Or, how easy it was for government, local and national, to pass laws forbidding church goers to attend church, even when following mandated precautions? Were we not offended that, by definition, churches are deemed "nonessential" businesses (Essential businesses are ones that the public rely on in their day-to-day life. This includes banks, hospitals, supermarkets, pharmacies, gas stations, post offices, and the like. They carry supplies necessary for survival, both in the long and short-term. In contrast, non-essential businesses are those that people frequent for pleasure, like gyms, bars, restaurants, movie theaters, museums, and concert halls, among others)? True, as one article reported, Are Church Services Considered 'Essential'? Depends Where You Live, means that laws against church attendance varied, but with the limit of ten persons to a building, what difference does it make?

The inability to attend church has been especially difficult for us Orthodox, for whom the Liturgy and Holy Eucharist are supreme elements in our life. Even here, our faith is being tested by doubts and inquiries as to how we worship, the veneration of icons, participation in the Eucharist, to name a few. Should we not be troubled by the fact that our method of distributing the Holy Eucharist is now being called into question? Dare we suggest that Holy Communion, the very Body and Blood of our Lord, can be a source of danger and illness? I find the very suggestion repulsive, and its source demonic. Yet, articles have already appeared considering the possibility of alternate methods of communion, several of them pandering to the panic-stricken fears initiated by the virus. How can we answer the onslaught of questions, uncertainties and difficulties created by such troubling discussions? For a start, I suggest a close and careful reading of the Prayers in preparation for Holy Communion and the Prayers after Communion. Much will be learned by having a clear account, through the medium of prayer, of how the Church views the benefits of this sacred Mystery given to us by the Lord Himself. Here, as in all things

Finally, progress on our future home continues. We are pending the closing on the sale of a small portion of our land to Rooney Properties. The Future Planning Committee continues to work with our consultants to put together the initial site plan for submittal to Loudoun County. This plan is to only identify building placement, parking and easements, as required by the county. These plans do not go into specific building design or floorplan, but only where the approximate building size can be efficiently placed on the property based on the studies. As new developments unfold, additional updates will be provided accordingly.

For the first few centuries of Christianity, there were no parishes as we understand them. Christians would gather in homes to celebrate the Eucharist, to be baptized, to learn about their faith. When St. Paul describes the Eucharist in 1 Corinthians 11:23-26, this celebration would have been conducted in a home..."

So, if you think about these things, you can see how we are able to make the New Testament Church present in our own homes today.

Please know that you are in our thoughts and prayers each week and we can't wait to see each of you when we are all allowed back in Church!


