We expect our festival to be another very successful event this year.



Celebrating this crucial week of our Savior's life on Earth, and reliving the Passion of our Lord and his Resurrection the way we do in the Orthodox Church is a powerful experience. I look forward to our big crowds and to helping as many of you find seats as possible. Our church is alive with love and excitement, and I as well as the rest of the Parish Council are proud to serve at your pleasure.


The Philoptochos

Niki started with just 30 original members. We used to meet in members' homes and started meeting in our new Parish facility as our membership grew. Under Niki's guidance we raised money to help needy families, organized collections for the Loudoun Abused Women's Shelter, helped support the Holy Protection Convent and our own Parish with bake sales and decorations of the sanctuary during special holy celebrations. Thank you Niki for all you did, and do, for Philoptochos and our Parish.

Please let me introduce our new board members: Anna Tjoumas is our vice president, Alexis Cleveland is our secretary and Tracey Alexandrou is your treasure. Our new team looks forward to continue to work and support the many projects we have done in the past, and to grow our membership.

We'd like to thank everyone who made our Winter Projects so successful. We collected 48 health kits for the International Orthodox Christian Charities, 18 units of blood for the Red Cross (which helps 54 patients), and we collected \$260 for The Agape Foundation. Catechetical School: Ultimate Sacrifice

There is no doubt in anyone's mind that this winter is one that will go down in the history books. The snow-fall was quite magnificent, yet gruesome to deal with. I know that for myself, shoveling all that snow was quite back-breaking. It was even more devastating when a few days later a snowplow came and covered up the sidewalks and the driveway I had so meticulously cleared.

In the midst of re-shoveling the plow covered sidewalks, I remembered my college days and especially a philosophy course dealing with the idea of "utilitarianism;" the main principle being belief of "the greater good for the greatest number of people." In this case, the main streets needed to be cleared for the sake of the many commuters in our neighborhood at the sacrifice of my driveway and sidewalks. I for one did not find this to be fair.

This idea of utilitarianism is further exemplified in the classic short story "The Lottery" by Shirley Jackson. In this course of study we were required to read a short story about a fictional, contemporary small town with an annual ritual known as the lottery. In this small village of 300 people, the locals are shown to be in a strange and nervous mood on one particular day. The children were gathering up stones as the adult townsfolk were assembling for this annual event. This local tradition, as practiced, was to ensure a good harvest and well being for the town as a whole. In the first round of the lottery, the head of each family would draw a small slip of paper; to see which family would get the slip with the black spot, meaning that this particular family would be the one chosen. In the next round, each family member would draw a slip, to see who would get the marked slip. In keeping with tradition, and in contrast to what we would accept, the winning family member would then calmly be stoned to death by everyone present as a sacrifice. This is one lottery that certainly no one wanted to win, yet all participated.

In contrast to this story, as Orthodox Christians we see God's self-willing sacrifice for the love of His creation; His only begotten Son Jesus Christ. As we read the Gospel in John 3:16, the beloved apostle St. John writes, "for God so loved the world that he gave



up His only begotten Son..." This is an ultimate sacrifice; not just my gripe of having to re-shoveling my walkways, or sacrificing an individual for a town's good harvest as in "The Lottery." Rather, the sacrifice of the sinless, unmarred lamb of God for the sins and ultimate salvation of our souls, and the world as a whole.

The Lenten period is one of forgiveness, self-sacrifice and, if I may add, ultimate gratitude for our Lord's love towards us. There is no greater love shown! I know that many of us as parents and grand-parents can not even fathom such a sacrifice, yet God did just that. These are some of the lessons and principles we try to instill to our children each Sunday in church. To the little ones through games, puzzles, and coloring; to the others through stories and examples of the early church fathers, martyrs and saints; and to the older groups through discussions and life experiences. We are blessed to have such talented, spiritual and devoted teachers who prayerfully facilitate our children.

However, aside from the Divine Liturgy and the Church service, the home also becomes a primary place for the family to embrace God. Let us all be mindful of His presence in our life as we and our families go through Lent and draw near to our Savior's tomb and glorious resurrection. May you and all your love ones have a Blessed Pascha!

GOPL Preschool: A Year in Review

The GOPL Preschool has had an exciting first year. The children have learned their upper- and lower-case letters, sounds and introductory reading in English and Greek, as well as numbers, days of the week, months and seasons in both languages. They have also been exposed to many countries of the world and basic science concepts. We are so proud of the children, who have adjusted to the school environment and have learned their schedule so well that they even direct us as to which activity comes next. They all enjoy playing with their peers, and learning about prayers and saint feast days. Many have developed strong connections to their saints, which is a joy to see. It is also refreshing to see the creativity the children exhibit during free play time.



We have had many interesting and fun-filled experiences with the children this year. In the fall we visited Pumpkinville in Leesburg, and St. Nektarios Monastery in Md., where the children received a blessing from His Eminence Metropolitan Evangelos. We also visited Ashburn Sports Bounce for some fun fellowship in January. We have learned many catchy and educational songs, and participated in activities and crafts in our classroom which emphasize the curriculum. We are joining the Hope/Joy on their lenten retreat to Agia Skepi monastery in White Haven, Pa. in March. We will be concentrating on the Lenten and Easter season in March and April, and the children will be learning "Christ Is Risen!" in both languages.

Registration for the 2010-2011 school year must be turned in by May 27, 2010. There are currently six spots available for children who are potty-trained and are turning three by August 31, and three spots left for children who are turning four by August 31. Classes will be offered Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday from 9:30 a.m. - 12:30 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays will focus on English pre-reading and writing skills, conversational Greek through songs, prayers and socialization, as well as offer a variety of special subjects and extra-curricular activities, including geography, science experiments,



math, computers, art, crafts, and physical education. Wednesdays will focus on Greek letters, games, crafts, and writing skills (as class/age appropriate). Tution is as follows: Tuesday/Thursday: \$200, Tuesday/Wednesday/Thursday: \$275. There is a one-time supply/registration fee of \$100. The supply/registration fee is due with registration in order to purchase supplies needed for your child and hold a spot for your child in the class. The fee is refundable until September 14. After school begins, the supply/registration fee is non-refundable.
