The incomprehensible condescension of our Lord, God, and Savior Jesus Christ to endure the Holy Passion for our sakes must move us to radically alter our priorities, to refocus our lives and renew our commitment to the One who IS, Christ our God. May your Lenten journey bear plentiful spiritual fruit which will avail for salvation.



### On the Sunday of Orthodoxy


Do you believe that God has power? Do you believe that our worship connects us to the power of God? Do you really believe it? Is that power as real to you as the power we manipulate through technology a thousand times a day. Are we as sure of God's power as we are of water pouring from the faucet when we turn the knob? Are we as sure of God's power as we are of flicking the switch and seeing the lights turn on. Let's think about it for a moment. What passes for conventional wisdom these days sees the post-modern world in which we live as a world in which faith no longer plays as important a role as it once did; God has become absent from the public forum because faith just doesn't have a place in the important discussions anymore.

The old debates of the faith seem silly in comparison to a discussion of some current scientific issue, for example, global warming. Why did they get so riled up about this or that heresy way back then. What's the difference, if you can't prove

any of it anyway? Global terror, now that's an issue. Who cares if people use icons to help them in worship. How much more efficient are we in cutting costs because of worship? Can we get greater accuracy of measurements through worship? No. We don't have faith anymore because we don't need it. It isn't germane anymore. The world has turned.

Well, this is all kind of an exaggeration to make this point: modern men and women actually have a lot of faith. It's just not recognized as such. In fact, people haven't really changed that much down the ages. In this generation we've just fooled ourselves into thinking we're so much different and better and smarter than those who've gone before, yet our mental habits haven't changed from the days when Paul traveled the Mediterranean. In those days, if you couldn't see it, or understand it, then it must have to do with the supernatural. Today we have just chosen to place our faith elsewhere. We place our faith in technology. We can't see it, we don't understand it, yet we use it to explain everything in our lives, whether empirical analysis applies or not.

Brothers and sisters, we Christians must ask ourselves if we believe in God's power as implicitly as we believe in the power of electricity. We must ask ourselves if we believe in the effectiveness of God's power just as surely as we believe in the effectiveness of stepping on the gas pedal. If our faith in God is as real to us as these other beliefs we hold without



even thinking about them, then our outlook must change. If we believe like that, then faith and the issues of worship are no longer trivial, but take center stage. If we really believe that correct worship is important, because God is involved and God's power is not to be trifled with, then we are going to make the effort to understand how correct worship is arrived at. If we believe in God and His power as strongly as we believe in the measurable, then the issues of the faith become the most important issues that there are.

This means that we have to do business in a completely different way. The accounting mentality can no longer drive decision making. Because the soul is real, and its condition must be accounted for. Cost reduction is no more important than sin reduction. Because sin is an affront to God, whose power is real. Quality of life in eternity is a real issue, much more real than the quality of our existence during this transitory time on earth.

When the Christian people of the 8th and 9th centuries struggled with iconoclasm, the rejection of icons as tools of worship, that struggle mattered. And it matters today. Those who reject the use of God's creation in the worship of God have lost an important facet of Christian understanding. They have fallen into the dualistic trap of ancient Greek philosophers who shunned the material in favor of the spiritual. They have lost sight of the fact that the Incarnation of our

Lord brings the created into contact with the Creator in an intimate way. When they reject the use of the material world in worship, they reject Christ's humanity. This means they are no longer Christian.

I know this is harsh, and goes against our instinct to be inclusive and open. But we dare not minimize these issues, for fear of losing our own faith in the reality of God's power, and its presence, His presence, in the worship which we have received from the generations.

Christian men and women through the ages dedicated their lives to the preservation of the truth. These saints gave themselves to torture and death, so that we might inherit the fullness of Christ's revelation, which is unchanging for all time. We dare not trivialize their sacrifice. We dare not ignore our responsibility to future generations to be as committed to the defense of the truth, to the living of the truth, as they were. We must embrace the call of God to honor His Holy Name. We must embrace the example of the saints through the ages who have shown us the way. We must make personal the decree proclaimed by the holy fathers of the 7th Ecumenical Council, who faithfully reinstated the use of icons in proper worship. Their synodical decree rings down through the ages like thunder rumbling across the plains --

As the Prophets beheld, as the apostles taught,
as the Church received, as the Teachers dogmatized,
as the Universe agreed, as Grace illumined,
as the Truth was revealed, as falsehood passed away,
as Wisdom presented, as Christ awarded,
Thus we declare, thus we assert,
thus we proclaim Christ our true God
and honor His saints,
in words, in writings,
in thoughts, in sacrifices,
in churches, in holy icons.

On the one hand, worshipping and reverencing Christ as God and Lord;

and on the other hand, honoring and venerating His saints, as true servants of the same Lord.

This is the Faith of the Apostles.

This is the Faith of the Fathers.

This is the Faith of the Orthodox.

This is the Faith which has established the Universe. Amen.


