A Message from Father George Alexson



Like millions of people world-wide, I, too, was glued to the television on March 13th when I heard that white smoke was billowing from the Sistene Chapel, announcing the election of a new Pope. Prior to the election, usually while following the evening news, I was interested to hear what Roman Catholics from all walks of life were hoping for in the new Pontiff. A variety of suggestions were expressed: 'I want him to bring the Church into the 21st century,' 'he needs to address the scandals facing the Church,' or, 'he must be able to relate to young people.' These are, prima facie, reasonable ambitions. But, what is really meant by statements like these? To begin, the Church-because she is a living organism, the Body of Christ--is as physically present "in" the 21st century as any other living being. Perhaps a more accurate inquiry would concern not the "in" but the "how;" that is, how does the Church manifest her presence in today's world. More often than not, when we hear words like "modernize" and "relate to" connected to the Church, what is actually meant is something like this: the Church has failed to "adjust" to the myriad social, ideological and cultural changes that we experience in the here and now.

Apparently, the new Pope is not wholly unaware of the feelings of many of his people. In his first Mass in the Sistene Chapel following his election he declared: "If we do not confess to Christ, what would we be? We would end up a compassionate NGO. What would happen would be like when children make sand castles and then it all falls down."

I congratulate the Pope for these words wisely spoken. Like all Christians, Orthodox and Roman Catholic, he knows well the conviction expressed by St. Paul the Apostle: "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever" (Heb. 13:8). What this means is that our Lord is forever the paradigm by which all conduct in all spheres of our life is measured. This is especially true for the spiritual and moral consciousness of the Church. "Times" may change; attitudes may vary; but the moral law of God as represented in the life and work of the Savior and His Church remains immutable. "Heaven and earth will pass away, but My words will by no means pas away" (Mt. 24:35). And, "Do not think that I came to destroy the Law or the Prophets. I did not come to destroy but to fulfill" (Mt. 5:17).

It comes as no surprise then, that following his election the Pope was described by some media outlets as a "doctrinal conservative." Well, now is the time for unequivocal clarity: for Orthodox, and I believe for Roman Catholics as well, "doctrinal liberal" is an empty phrase. We need to affirm without hesitation the principle that, doctrine/dogma is equal to Truth, capitalized because truth is not a philosophical or scientific system for us, but the very Person of Christ Himself. The doctrines of the Church are not up for debate. They express truths about God, the Church and the God-man relationship that are both factual and universal. Of course, we are free to either accept or reject them; but, do we have the right to expect the Church to deny/ revise the Truth that has guided her for over two thousand years simply because the "times have changed"? In the words of our Lord, "He who is not with Me is against Me, and he who does not gather with Me scatters abroad" (Mt. 12:30).

As such, all dogmas defined by the Church (guided by the Holy Spirit into all truth as promised by our Lord, cf. John 16, 13) are applicable in all times and places. Whether teachings on how we define God as Trinity; on the moral and spiritual life-style required for active membership in the Body of Christ; dogmas on the role of the Virgin Mary and the saints, iconography, etc.; all have but one underlying principle: to witness to the purpose of the Messiah's advent: "For the law was given through Moses, but grace and truth came through Jesus

Christ" (John 1:17). There are two properties intrinsic to Truth that set Christ as truth apart from everything else: the Truth sets us free (John 8:32) and it sanctifies us (John 17:19). Sanctification opens to us the possibility/necessity of maturing in the "mind" and life of Christ (I Cor. 2:16), while true freedom exposes the madness of evil and the joy of "slavery" in God.

The Christian definition of good and evil cannot/will not change with the "times." Neither "modern" attitudes, "cultural shifts" or political legislation can change the fact that abortion, euthanasia, sexual deviancy, pornography (to list but a few of the indecencies challenging the moral fabric of contemporary society) remain innately impossible alternatives to the life in Christ. What was prohibited by God on Mt. Sinai and perfected in grace by our Lord remains forbidden today. All attempts to modify the spiritual and moral insight and authority of the Law have but one destination-- further alienation from God and continued moral and spiritual decline. The Church, in the words of St. Paul, is forever obliged to exhort all peoples to meditate on, "whatever things are true, whatever things are noble, whatever things are just, whatever things are pure, whatever things are lovely, whatever things are of good report..." (Philip. 4:8).

As the Pope said, if we fail to preach Christ...what is the reason for our existence? Either we witness to the Truth or remain silent; there is no middle ground. If we remain silent, we allow the "times" and the evil thereof to accomplish what has always failed in the past: to marginalize and silence our witness to the Gospel. I have no doubt that as time passes, the tribulations of the Church and Her faithful will increase. Indeed, a new age of martyrs is always a possibility. Nevertheless, we pray that God, in all times through all things, will give us the courage to witness to the Truth with faith and love.

GOYA

For those new to our Church, GOYA (Greek Orthodox Youth Association) is the youth group for 13-18 year olds. We are active in four elements: Worship, Witness, Service and Fellowship.

We maintain an on-going food pantry collection, which is delivered to local food and homeless shelters. During Lent, we will be collecting LAUNDRY and CLEANING SUPPLIES. As always, food is welcome too. We thank our Parish for all of their generous donations.

In January, we prepared bag lunches for the Homeless Shelter in Leesburg. The food and hyperthermia center donations were greatly welcomed at the Leesburg Center, since they were down to very few meals. Some of our Yiayias and our former GOYAns who were on break from college joined in the fun. During the Taste of Greece, our GOYAns served in various areas and some performed in our dance troupe.

Our now annual Talent Show was in February. The GOYAns hosted a dinner for the Yiayias and Pappous in our Parish. There were 40 people seated at tables in our hall. The fellowship between the generations was wonderful and the goal of this event! After dinner, the Yiayias, Pappous and GOYAn families enjoyed a talent show presented by many of our GOYAns and siblings. We watched performances on a guitar, flute, trombone, tuba, keyboard, a marimba solo, a vocal number from Les Mis and Greek folk dances. To keep the show moving between acts, trivia kept the audience entertained.

The beautiful part of coordinating this program was the outpouring of the GOYAns to step up to make it happen. They designed the flyers and programs, encouraged the Yiayias and Pappous to attend, offered their various talents, MC'd the show, set up and cleaned up. We appreciated all our GOYAn families who assisted with the cooking, setting up all the tables and clean up. We look forward to another talent show next year.

During Lent, Father George will be joining us for some Lenten Talks to help us travel through this great period. The discussions will be after Liturgy on March 31st and April 14th. Please plan to attend.

In 2011 I became engaged to a wonderful, kind, true southern gentleman. Todd Walter. All of a sudden our lives and families - including our daughters from previous marriages were going to be blended. We discussed schools and visitation schedules, his military career, our new home, where the girls' rooms would be, the possibility of having more children. And our faith.

Todd grew up in a Southern Baptist home. I grew up in a mixed household - my mother is Greek and my father is Iranian. I was taught to love God and believe in Christ but we did not attend church regularly. I am an Orthodox Christian. It was important for us to worship together as a family. Todd had been to an Orthodox church one Sunday while visiting my godson in Philadelphia. He was quiet afterwards and didn't understand why it was so ornate. We decided to start coming to this Parish for answers after we were encouraged by my very sweet next door neighbor, Marina Blair.

Soon we were coming very regularly. People became familiar. My younger daughter Lina and I would sadly leave Todd & Katlyn behind while we received communion. We asked Father George about our wedding and he was adamant that Todd not convert to Orthodoxy for the wrong reasons, but that he truly understood and embraced the faith first. Soon after we married, Katlyn and Todd began Orthodoxy classes here at church with Father George and some other parishioners. My husband and oldest daughter were Chrismated (became Orthodox) on Saturday May 19th 2012. My thea Georgia is Todd's (Thomas) nouna and Marina is Katlyn's (Katerina) nouna. We are so blessed.

For us, raising a family in our church has been so important. We literally have hundreds of extended family members. Each of you are fundamental role models for our children. In this regard, Todd says our community is just like his childhood...every neighbor his mom knew also had spanking rights! Our situation may be slightly unique because we are a blended family but all of our children absolutely need the structure, guidance, and unconditional love this church provides. There are too many negative influences out in the world today.

That is my family's story. The truth is, our involvement in this church has largely been influenced by the gentle encouragement of very special families and a strong presiding priest who is always available to answer our spiritual questions. Sunday School

The Catechetical staff of the Greek Orthodox Parish of Loudoun County was honored to sponsor a pre-Lenten retreat with our guest speaker, Igumen Fr. Sergius, Abbot of St. Tikhon's Monastery in South Canaan, PA. We welcomed Fr. Sergius into our Parish with the Blessings of Metropolitan Evangelos and Fr. George, on Saturday February 23, 2013, and he presented a talk on "Prayer and Fasting". The lecture was well attended, not only by our parishioners, but also by the faithful of other Orthodox parishes. Fr. Sergius shared with us his vast knowledge on this topic, through Scripture and Orthodox Practices, as well as his experiences as a monk in preparing for Great Lent.

In addition, his traveling companion, Brother Anthony, set up a table and made available various books, icons, incense and other religious items for purchase by the attendees. Last but not least, Fr. Sergius blessed us by bringing to our church the Holy Myrrh Bearing Icon of St. Anna for veneration and anointment with her Holy Myrrh. She was truly a Blessing to all. On Sunday, Fr. 




