parishioners, covers our summer months, June to August; another will not appear until September. I seize this opportunity, therefore, to encourage you during this time of summer vacations and respite, to contemplate and pray about the prophecy recorded above.

I appealed to this passage from scripture on Sunday, May 20, for two specific reasons: first, as an opening to the report given by members of our Future Planning Committee; second, because on this Sunday we were concluding our Sunday School and Greek School programs for the year. It was an ideal opportunity, a gathering of old and young—parents, grandparents, students and teachers—, all devoted members of our young and growing parish. Most important of all, during the Committee's report we had surrounding us the maximum compelling argument for growth and development—our children. In them we could see the very reasons for hope, careful planning and commitment to the future.

On many occasions I have commended the founders and members of this yet-to-be-named community for their extraordinary achievements. They make it possible for us to witness to Orthodoxy in one of the fastest growing and wealthiest counties in our nation. Generations to come will praise both their wisdom and efforts. Today, Orthodox faithful of diverse backgrounds gather in our present humble and love-filled church, to worship the Holy Trinity, strengthening our faith day by day. Truly, when God is for us, who can be against us?

Yet, we are quickly outgrowing our facilities. We need a home, a place we can look to as our spiritual anchor in a world that constantly challenges the most basic spiritual and moral tenets of our Faith; a place where we can gather for worship, prayer, study, cultural and social enrichment. Consider this: our children attend public or private schools where they are instructed in environments using the most sophisticated and modern techniques. Should they not enjoy the same advanced resources when coming to Sunday School and Greek School? Should we not have a permanent place where we can all gather together as members of God's family, to benefit from genuine Orthodox fellowship? These are but a few of the questions and challenges that face us as we reflect on the nature of our future. Yes, much work needs to be done. Together we can move mountains (Matthew 17:20). All we need is unwavering trust in the Lord and in our ability to continue the work of our forefathers and mothers, who, over the years sacrificed more than we will ever know, to preserve our Orthodox Faith in a country that was not always hospitable to strangers. They overcame much because they believed greatly and loved their children immensely. Let us use all resources available to us, to equal in our own day and age their miraculous faith and accomplishments. Let us make our children's dreams a reality. Let us be a people of vision! May God make it so!

Dean Coulopoulos Andrew Kaffes Paul Orphanides Cynthia Smith



Philoptochos

Springtime and Easter time has been a busy time for the Philoptochos. Leading up to Easter, the Philoptochos coordinated and sent its first ever Easter card for our community. Our community's young children submitted colorful and artistic interpretations of the theme "He is Risen." A selection committee chose the drawing of Maria Kaffes, age 9, for the card's cover. This springtime fundraiser made possible a \$400 contribution to the Loudoun Citizens for Social Justice/LAWS (Loudoun Abused Women's Shelter), a significant gift for LAWS at a time of the year when contributions can ebb. We warmly thank the children who participated in the artistic competition for the card's cover, and all the families and individuals who chose to be included in the Easter card, and made possible this generous contribution to LAWS.

Our Philoptochos members also joined Hope/Joy and GOYA families in the folding of palms for Palm Sunday on Lazarus Saturday. In just a couple short hours our community's children participated in true teamwork in palm cross folding, while Philoptochos members separated, folded, and decorated the church with palms for the next day. It was a fun and quick afternoon of fellowship in practice, and we thank all those who participated in the folding of the palms.

Easter preparations also mean church Easter flowers and the decoration of the epitafios, or kouvouklion, for Holy Friday evening. This year were very blessed to have the active guidance and participation of our immensely knowledgeable Presvytera Ioanna who led a team of volunteers on Holy Friday morning to the creation of what was by many accounts the most elegantly stunning epitafios decoration our church has seen. Our Presvytera's guidance together with the savvy business acumen of our Efty Anthony who negotiates, orders and coordinates the Easter flower arrangements made possible an exceptionally beautifully decorated church during Great Lent, Holy Week and Easter. Our warm thanks go to Presvytera and Efty, and naturally to all the so many volunteers who participated with their time and talents in creating flower arrangements and decorating the epitafios, and to all the individuals and families who generously made a special Easter flower contribution that made it all possible.

In May our Philoptochos held its last meeting until the Fall, and I took the relay from Cynthia Smith at the helm of our chapter. For those who don't know me yet, I was born in Athens where I lived the first sixteen years of my life. I am very well versed in the Greek language and speak five more. My studies brought me to the U.S. where I have lived for more than 20 years now. I met my husband Bill, or Vasili, a first generation Greek, fourteen years ago and we were

married in Greece. We have been blessed with a son, Nicholas, now six years old, and growing older much too quickly. In the Pre-Kindergarten level, we have Loula Lagadinos and Vasilia Ravaris, both are young mothers and truly committed to the children and our parish activities. Ms. Loula is the President of our Ladies Philoptochos and Ms. Vasilia is the principal of our Greek School. They provide a warm and loving environment, which makes the children happy to come each Sunday. I know because my granddaughter is one of the students and she is quite excited and thrilled with the activities every time she goes to Sunday school. Member in the Spotlight

Christine Poulias

Where are you from (in the U.S. and your roots in Greece)?

I was born in Illinois, and raised Roman Catholic with a family background that includes German, French and Italian. My husband's family is from Sparta. I converted to Orthodoxy when we married to ensure our future family would worship together.

Who is in your family?

Our family includes my husband Nektarios (Terry) and our two children, Luke and Kalliope (Kayla). Oh ... and our miniature Schnauzer, Max.

Any interesting facts about you, your family or your Hellenic heritage?

While we have never seen official documentation, our Theo Socrates in Greece claims he has traced the Poulias family bloodline all the way to King Constantine.

What are your interests/hobbies?

Family is very important to us, so we do a lot together. Recently, we attended a Twilight Polo match at Great Meadow and had a wonderful time watching the horses while enjoying a picnic on the grass. We also enjoy biking, camping, and cooking. Me personally, I enjoy photography, art and music. I have a guitar that has sat in my living room for a decade, mocking me that I still have not learned to play. I hope to make this the year!

How did you come to our parish?

We moved to Ashburn in 2008, after having lived in Canada for 10 years. We were members of St. Peter & Paul's in Kitchener, Ontario and really enjoyed Fr. Constantine Chatzis' services. He made you feel welcome and really took the time to get to know the parish members. He had a passion for preaching and would sometimes bring himself to tears during his own sermons. While we were excited for the opportunity our move back to the US was going to bring us, it was very difficult to leave our church and knew it would be even more difficult to find one that came close in comparison. We visited a few in the area, but they just seemed so far away. One morning I was browsing the local paper and saw a Greek Orthodox Easter Service ad for Loudoun County (thanks, Susan!) and remember calling up the stairs to my husband to come take a look at what I just found in the paper! Our first Easter back in the US was celebrated at the Greek Orthodox Parish of Loudoun County, and we have never left.



What aspects or ministries of our parish are you involved with?

My son is an altar boy, and both children attend Sunday School. We look forward to the Christmas pageant every year, where I join my children by singing in the pageant choir. I used to love listening to my grandmother sing in church; she sang a beautiful Ave Maria. My childhood priest once said, "He who sings in church prays twice." As of recent, I have helped with some of the Taste of Greece advertising and my husband helps out in the kitchen. My mother-in-law recently handed down her Prosphora stamp to us, so I hope to learn how to make it. I apologize in advance if it tastes "a little less than heavenly" while I work out the recipe.

What are your hopes for the future of our parish?

We are committed to seeing our parish succeed. To tell you the truth, I like the small and humble atmosphere of our existing church, but realize that as we grow we will need a greater space to do greater things.

What have you enjoyed most about our parish?

First and foremost, the service includes a lot of English. I have been to other churches that perform their services primarily in Greek and I can't help but feel disconnected. I don't want that for my children. I want them to be engaged in the sermon and understand what is being said and take that message to heart. Ironically, the first time my husband (who is fluent in Greek) attended Easter Service at GOPLC, he told me just how moving it was to hear (in English) the Lamentations of Mary and the expression of her grief. It never moved him that way in Greek.

Secondly, I would have to say that I enjoy the way Father John, and now Father George, preach their sermons in a way that is down to Earth and relevant to our generation and our society. Things change and I think it is important for a priest to constantly find new ways to reach their parish ... especially the youth (and our church is abundant in youth).

Last, but certainly not least, I love that we say the Lord's Prayer in so many different languages. It really is a beautiful testament of the unity of our faith. I would hate to ever see that go.
